CHIPPEWA FALLS COUNCIL NO. 974

The history of Goldsmith Council No. 974 Knights of Columbus of Chippewa Falls, Wisconsin is largely the extraordinary history of two men because their history and that of the Council are closely identified during the first fifteen years of the Council's existence.

The story of the two men of whom we speak is the story of a partnership and friendship which first developed in the field of public education. It then shifted into the field of law, and finally grew into full bloom in the priestly service of the Church.

As to the Council, it is the story of the roles played by these two men in the organization, institution and development of the Council, and of the influence of these men on the character of the Council.

It should be pointed out, however, that only one member of the partnership participated in the organization and institution of Council No. 974, for the other was not yet a Catholic at the time. In the designs of Almighty God he was given the grace of conversion, and in less than two years he embraced the Catholic Faith and almost immediately became a Knight of Columbus. Then began the remarkable saga of these two men as exponents and exemplifiers of Columbianism at its very best.

The founding and early career of Goldsmith Council No. 974 and the part played therein by one of the members of this unusual partnership is best related by the other member when he said:

"The record of Goldsmith Council No. 974 is a glorious one. It was outstanding be-

cause of the talents, the abilities, the faith, and the devotion and the Catholic character of the charter class, almost without exception. Truly, there were giants in those days. But towering above them all was James R. Murphy. No doubt I am biased, but, in my opinion, he, more than any other made Goldsmith Council No. 974 what it was during its first fifteen years. During that period he dominated the Council.

"You ask me where I belong in this picture. Surely, it must be said, in all fairness and truth, that whatever I accomplished was done under the direction and inspiration of James R. Murphy! Without him, I would have been utterly unknown."

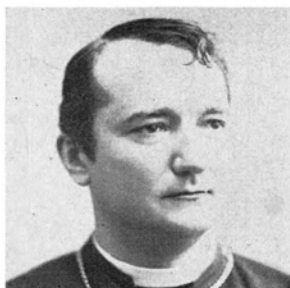
Those deeply earnest and sincere words are the sentiments of J. Howard Browne, the other member of the famous team of Murphy and Browne.

But to return to Goldsmith Council No. 974 instituted on April 30, 1905, and the part played by Murphy and Browne in its career:

Most active of its charter membership in the organization of the Council was James R. Murphy, then principal of the Chippewa Falls public high school, and an outstanding Catholic gentleman, highly esteemed and respected by the community, Catholic and non-Catholic.

That was in 1905, when Goldsmith Council No. 974 came into being with the late George B. McCall, then mayor of Chippewa Falls, as its first Grand Knight.

The Council had been named after its first Chaplain, the late Rev. Francis Xavier Gold-

smith, pastor of Notre Dame Church of Chippewa Falls, an outstanding and learned priest, loved and respected by members of all faiths and creeds in his community. He died in 1909.

In 1906, there came to Chippewa Falls a young man recently graduated from Stevens Point Normal School, who became principal of the Columbia St. public grade school. He was J. Howard Browne, son of a Vernon county Protestant minister, the Rev. F. J. Browne.

An immediate and fast friendship, terminated only by the death of one in 1943, sprang up between the two. Browne became a roomer and boarder at the Murphy home, where Murphy lived with his widowed mother.

In the following year, on April 6, 1907, Browne was baptized a Catholic in the Goldsmith Memorial Chapel, Chippewa Falls, by the Rev. Francis A. Ratka, C.S.Sp. On April 14, the week following, he received his first Holy Communion in Notre Dame Church, Chippewa Falls, and where 13 years later both, Murphy and Browne, were ordained to the Catholic priesthood.

Browne made it plain that Murphy had never broached the subject of becoming a Catholic. "It was," said Browne, "the example of his daily life, in his daily association with his fellowmen, that impelled me to look deeper into a religion that appeared to be the very life of James R. Murphy. He was truly a practical Catholic, a layman who really worked at and lived this religion, not ostentatiously but humbly and quietly. It was the beautiful and impressive example of his life that led me, a non-Catholic, into the church."

Three months after his reception into the church, Browne became a Knight of Columbus. This was on July 21, 1907, when Eau Claire

Council No. 1257 was instituted. The major degree was directed by the late John F. Martin, Green Bay, State Deputy at that time.

Almost immediately thereafter, there came into being another striking partnership, — the team of Murphy and Browne — able, efficient and eloquent exponents of how the First and Second degrees of the Knights of Columbus should be exemplified. Alternating as Grand Knight and Chancellor in conferring these two degrees, the team of Murphy and Browne soon became known all over this State and Minnesota.

Both served as Grand Knights of Goldsmith Council No. 974 one closely succeeding the other. From 1914 to 1916, Browne was appointed District Deputy and directed many major degrees with the Goldsmith Council third degree team exemplifying the ritual.

Both men continued in their educational work until 1910. Then both resigned their public school principalships, took the Wisconsin bar examination and on October 12, 1910 (appropriately Columbus Day) were admitted to the bar. While teaching school they had studied law and attended summer sessions at the University of Wisconsin.

The association of these two friends was now about to be launched upon its next career — the law firm of Murphy and Brown.

To the practice of law they brought the same keen intellects and logical thinking which had distinguished their educational career and it was not long before the law firm of Murphy and Browne became one of the leading legal establishments in the community and Murphy was named the city attorney of Chippewa Falls.

During their law career they continued their activities in the Knights of Columbus, giving freely of their time and effort to advance the cause of Columbianism. Their constructive influence keenly reached upon the state organization.

In 1916 the team of Murphy and Browne created a minor cataclysm in the community,

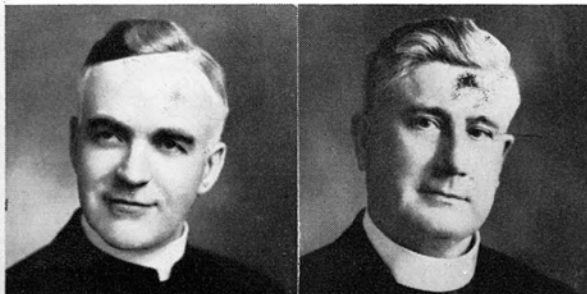
when they quietly and modestly announced that the law firm of Murphy and Browne was about to be dissolved. The two partners, the announcement said, were ending their practice of law to study for the Catholic priesthood.

"We realized," said Browne, "that while it was a fine thing to aid in the administration of human law, it was better still to aid in the administration of divine law. We never, either of us, regretted our decision."

They entered St. Mary's seminary, Ferndale, Conn., and two years later entered St. Francis seminary, Milwaukee for another two years.

On May 1, 1920, before an immense gathering of faithful, filling to capacity Notre Dame Church, Chippewa Falls, James R. Murphy and J. Howard Browne were ordained priests of the Holy Catholic, and Apostolic Church by the late Bishop James Schwebach, Bishop of La Crosse, Wisconsin.

As priests they distinguished themselves even more than they had as educators and as lawyers. They never lost their zeal for and interest in Columbianism, and continued actively in the councils in the parishes to which they were called to serve. Both also rendered distinguished service in the larger field of Columbianism by serving as State Chaplains of the Wisconsin State Council — Father Browne from 1925 to 1928 and Father Murphy, 1928 to 1930.

With their first assignments as pastors, the two friends were separated for the first time since their days as school principals. Father Murphy became Pastor of the Catholic Church

at Seneca, Wis., and Father Browne at Rising Sun, Wis. Two years later Father Murphy was assigned to Elroy, Wis. From Rising Sun, Father Browne was assigned to the Chaplaincy at St. Mary's hospital, Baraboo, Wis. and later to Kendall, Wis.

But in 1936 they were together again. Father Murphy's eyesight began to fail and Bishop Alexander J. McGavick, then Bishop of La Crosse, thoughtfully sent Father Browne to serve as his assistant.

Five years later, in 1941, Father Murphy was forced to resign his Pastorate at Elroy because of ill health. He returned as a patient to St. Joseph's Hospital, Chippewa Falls. Bishop McGavick with characteristic kindness and consideration again arranged for the two friends to be together. He appointed Father Browne as Chaplain of the same hospital in which Father Murphy was a patient.

The two were finally back in the city where their remarkable friendship was first formed 35 years before, among many of their old friends and co-workers in education, in law, in the church and in the Knights of Columbus. This reunion was destined to continue until it was ended by the sudden death of Father Murphy, on July 3, 1943.

Father Browne was the celebrant of the Solemn Requiem Mass held in Notre Dame Church, Chippewa Falls, before a throng that included more than 75 clergy from all sections of Wisconsin, State and Council officers, members of the Knights of Columbus, and many others including scores of non-Catholics.

Father Browne, to whom the death of Father Murphy was a severe blow, remained in retirement for some time, and then was assigned to the pastorate of St. Thomas church, at Potosi, Wis., where he is presently stationed. He still retains his interest in the Knights of Columbus but is no longer active in the organization.

Such is essentially the story of "Murphy and Browne," and in a general way the history of Goldsmith Council No. 974 of Chippewa Falls. However, as Father Browne insists that

"There were giants in those days," the history of this Council will be taken up in greater detail, with special reference to the distinguished men who worked with Murphy and Browne in Columbianism and highlighted Goldsmith Council's 45 years as a member of Wisconsin State Council.

Goldsmith Council No. 974 has furnished a State Deputy, a State Advocate, a State Warden, four District Deputies; it was represented at six Supreme Conventions, and has entertained the State Convention twice, first in 1920 and again in 1930, its silver anniversary year.

The late William O. Kelm, a prominent attorney of Chippewa Falls, and former resident of Portage, was elected State Deputy at the 1920 Convention, but died the fall of the same year. He was a delegate to the 1920 Supreme Convention in New York City.

Frank R. Hughes, one of the three living charter members of the Council and for years active in the Order, in state, district and local levels, and more recently, until his retirement, postmaster at Chippewa Falls, served as State Advocate from 1918 to 1920 and as District Deputy in 1921-22. He also attended the 1920 Supreme Convention in New York as a delegate from Wisconsin. He is the oldest living Past Grand Knight, 1916-1917.

Henry J. Reden, Jr., served two terms as State Warden, from 1934 to 1936, and attended the 1936 Supreme Convention in Toronto, Canada as a delegate and another the Boston Convention, in 1930. He was commissioned to attend the Supreme Convention by Goldsmith Council No. 974 in recognition of his work in promoting the 1930 State Convention at Chippewa Falls. He has also been on the Wisconsin State Knights of Columbus

Publicity Committee. He has attended 25 successive State Conventions.

Henry J. Reden, Jr. is also the second oldest living Past Grand Knight of the Council, 1930-1932 and has held virtually every chair position in the Council, including the post financial secretary and Lecturer. He has been a member of the Order for 32 years.

The late Louis A. Piotrowski was another one of the very active and energetic members of Goldsmith Council No. 974, serving several terms as District Deputy, 1916-18 and again from 1938 to 1942. He was also an elected delegate to the 1927 Supreme Convention in Portland, Oregon.

His brother, the late John B. Piotrowski, was likewise one of the outstandingly active members of the Council, serving as Financial Secretary from 1912 to 1917.

James R. Harris was District Deputy during the years 1932 and 1933 and a delegate to the 1930 Supreme Convention in Boston, Massachusetts.

William P. Cruse was a Wisconsin representative to the 1922 Supreme Convention in Atlantic City, New Jersey.

Besides Frank R. Hughes, the only two Chippewa Falls surviving charter members of Goldsmith Council are John A. Brooks, still active in the insurance business in Chippewa Falls, and Joseph Sokup, Sr., retired grocer. The latter's four sons, Peter, Bernard, Leo and Joseph, Jr., all are members of the Knights of Columbus.

Since we've mentioned families whose sons are Knights of Columbus, the Nicolai family boasts six brothers, all of whom are members of Goldsmith Council No. 974 — Harry, William, Royal, Clarence, Leonard and Albert. Royal is a Past Grand Knight.

Reference has already been made in this history to the fact that Father J. Howard Browne, before his ordination, served as District Deputy from 1914-1916 and directed the Goldsmith Council third degree team in several major degrees. He was a delegate to the 1915

Supreme Convention in Seattle, Washington.

Goldsmith Council No. 974 has also had several first and second degree teams.

The Council was ever a generous giver to all worthwhile causes, contributing \$940 to the Marquette University Endowment Fund in the 1920's; it has been prominent in civic activities and projects. The Council owns its own home, formerly St. John's hall, which was purchased from St. John the Baptist Society.

Sixty-nine members of Goldsmith No. 974 served in World War I and eighteen in World War II. Frederick G. and Henry P. Svetlik made the supreme sacrifice in World War I. One member, Henry Hughes, was seriously wounded in World War II.

The Council had on its Council roster a veteran and survivor of another war — the Indian wars — and at the time of his death, July 27, 1950, the last survivor of the Infantry Company that participated in the pursuit of the famous Geronimo, the Apache chief.

John Schemensky was 87 years old at the time of his death and up to within a few months of his last illness had been a regular attendant at the meetings of Goldsmith Council. He was one of the most active and faithful workers for the Council.

Born in Germany in 1863, John Schemen-

sky came to America in 1882, at the age of 19, and in 1885 enlisted in the Army in New York. He was sent to Santa Fe and assigned to Co. C, 13th Infantry for border duty. At the same time there were stationed at Santa Fe two companies of the 6th Cavalry. A young lieutenant in one of these cavalry companies was known as "Black Jack," later General John J. Pershing, commander-in-chief of the American overseas forces in World War I.

John Schemensky was discharged from the army in 1890 with the rank of Corporal. He bought a ticket to Berlin, Wis., to see his boyhood sweetheart who had come over from Germany. They were married and the young groom opened a shoe repair shop in Berlin.

Twelve years later the family moved to Chippewa Falls, where John Schemensky worked in various shoe factories for many years.
